6 Upper Sioux Agency State Park & State **Historic Site**

Established by the federal government in 1854 to be a center for instructing the Dakota People on farming methods. Campgrounds, trails, river fishing, and rental tipis.

Wood Lake Monument and Battlefield

Walk a path along Wood Lake Creek where forces of General Sibley and Chief Little Crow battled. A monument was built in 1910 in memory of those who died in this battle.

View displays of the granite ruins of Brown's home which was destroyed during the U.S.-Dakota War of 1862. Brown was a politician, inventor, publisher and Indian Agent.

The largest municipal park in the state, the park features campground facilities, shelter houses, paved hiking trails, a DNR trout stream, Ramsey Falls, scenic overlooks, and a zoo.
